FROM THE HEAD OF COLLEGE

Dear Old Boys and friends of Marist College Ashgrove,

Thank you for your kind welcome and messages of encouragement at my appointment as Head of Marist College Ashgrove, a renowned and esteemed College that educates young men in our Marist Tradition, inspiring them to love, learn, lead and serve (College Mission Statement).

My first association with the College was in 1985 when I spoke to the Year 12 boys at an assembly and facilitated an evening prayer at the boarding house. My memories were of polite and friendly boys who had great pride in their school. Further, I recalled with surprise and admiration, the many boys who dropped their bags at the Chapel door on the way to school each day, to walk in and say a small prayer before scurrying off to class. This is a tradition that I hope continues into the future.

There were also my memories as a student at St Joseph's College, Hunters
Hill where, annually, we played hard fought Rugby games against Marist College Ashgrove. These were always
challenging as the young men with the golden jerseys proved to be a most formidable opposition, indeed. The
Brothers at Joeys seemed to be up for these games – "it's an important game to win" – reflecting the respect they
had for Marist Ashgrove.

Now, as a Head of College, I am pleased to be guiding and leading this wonderful College with my new colleagues. I marvel at the fact that we stand on the shoulders of some outstanding giants of the past, including Headmasters whom I admire: Br Jack Alman, Br Alexis Turton, Br Geoffrey Joy (also my Principal as a boy), Br Terrence Heinrich, Br Neville Solomon and of course, the first lay Principal, Mr Peter McLoughlin. As Principals, all of these men have left their legacy and indelible mark on the College and the boys.

Today, our world is changing at a fast pace, presenting many complexities and challenges. Educators are faced with a myriad of external and societal influences, where even political rhetoric impacts on our schools. Current discussions and educational expectations lie in the areas of sexuality & gender education, consent, alcohol, drugs & vaping, IT, social media and our digital footprint world, discrimination, the environment, the publication of academic results, and so on. Therein lies our call to educate all boys holistically in this modern world with its new and extensive challenges.

The rudder that keeps us on a straight course, or the lens through which we view all these complex educational issues is that of the Marist charism. Br Michael Green (fms) writes beautifully and extensively regarding that which is quintessential, or at the heart of what it means to be Marist. I share with you a few of his inspiring thoughts:

The Presence of God

All human beings are loved by God. Each day we are called to reflect upon and deepen our experience of God's loving presence within ourselves and others. We are all called at Marist Ashgrove to enter into an intimate affair of the heart – a conversation between God and me. Fr. Champagnat spoke often in his practical way along the lines that prayer is just as important as the business of the day.

Trust in God

In all things we must trust in God with confidence. Fr Champagnat said 'The bigger the intention, the more we should ask for and the more pleasing this is to God'.

Love of Jesus and the Gospel

Fr Champagnat shaped his order after becoming moved while speaking to a dying boy who had little education and knew nothing about God. From here St Marcellin Champagnat was empowered to 'make Jesus Christ Known & Loved.' We need to make the gospels and teachings of Christ a central part of ourselves. We reflect on Christ's great love for each person through his birth as a human (crib), his ultimate sacrifice for us (cross) and his covenant he shares with us in love (altar).

In Mary's Way

We pray to Mary, because she always had her beloved son within her arms or heart. Champagnat believed that the son would never refuse his mother's wishes. Mary was Fr Champagnat's reliable source, the one whom he trusted in.

Family Spirit

Fr. Champagnat espoused the qualities of family to all – able to be ourselves and accepted for who we are, forgiven, supported, joyful, forgetful of self, open to others and loving. He spoke of Jesus as 'his sacred heart' and Mary as 'our good mother' in very loving and endearing maternal terms.

Simplicity

Fr Marcellin Champagnat had an authentic and simple faith. His faith was integral, trusting and openhearted. Like Mary's Prayer, "The Magnificat" we need to be aware of our personal giftedness as a blessing from God, and so remain humble and modest at all times.

Love of Work

The simple lifestyle that St Marcellin Champagnat espoused, courageously calls us to make do with our resources and talents. With our giftedness from God, let service, compassion, empathy and a devotedness to all and especially those most in need, be core.

Today, more than ever, schools like Marist College Ashgrove are so important to the educational debate, fabric and landscape of this city of Brisbane and country of Australia. We provide an education, based on the values, principles and ethics of a gentleman, a saint named Fr. Marcellin Champagnat. Complimenting this is our namesake 'Marist', our devotion and role model 'Mary our good mother' who provides us with a feminine perspective on how we should interpret and commit to the Gospels – 'All to Jesus through Mary'. These quintessential beliefs and philosophies, their faith and fortitude, their example and inspiration, forms the basis of who we are and what we stand for. That is, to provide our boys today with a faith based educational experience with sound and logical values, forming young men who can lead, serve, love and in the spirit of humility continue to learn and grow each day.

Let us, as the Marist family, take on this inspiring charism with both hands, as we continue to embrace our College and each of the boys in our care to become young men, full of hope, faith and passion striving for a positive future together.

I look forward to meeting, engaging and partnering with many Old Boys and supporters the College in the years

THE OLD BOYS SALUTE THE INCREDIBLE DAVE CAMERON

In May this year, the Marist College Community suffered a devastating loss with the sudden passing of our beloved Dave Cameron who was still, as always, performing a magnificent role as the College archivist.

There was only one man who could put into words what Dave meant to our community.

Dave Cameron, who unexpectedly died on May 4, 2021, was the adopted son of Joyce and Alf Cameron and twin brother of Derek. Beginning on July 16, 1950, his was by today's standards not a long life; but if deeds rather than longevity be the measure of the man, Dave's life was rich, full and well lived.

He grew up in a world far simpler than contemporary times, where conservative social values were the order of the day and where institutions such as Church, School and the Scouting movement set the bar for acceptable conduct. Participating eagerly in all the opportunities thus presented, Dave absorbed those values and held true to them for the rest of his days. It was also a time where 'people made their own fun' and that statement vouchsafed a whole world of hands-on activities where interactions with peers and their families generated a rich and supportive social climate. While contemporary critics might label that view of days gone by as naive or uninformed, Dave remembered it as the foundation of a fortunate life and used the word 'idyllic' to describe his childhood.

Perhaps as a portent for the future, the fickle finger of chance meant that living next door in Mitchelton was Ray Lindwall, test cricketer and one of the greatest Australian fast bowlers. The predictable result was that the whole neighbourhood was cricket mad and Dave lived for the time that the great man would participate in our interminable backyard games. He showed considerable talents and participation in school and club cricket honed his skills. It became a lifelong interest - perhaps 'addiction' is a better word, considering the blood, sweat and tears Dave expended on behalf of the fortunes of Queensland and Australian cricket in decades of passionate support.

Supported and encouraged by his caring parents, Dave completed his schooling with great success, especially in English and the social sciences. After earning a History Honours Arts degree at the University of Queensland, he opted to become a secondary school teacher through completing his Diploma of Education. Posted to Murgon State High School, Dave began another chapter of his life in his first extended period away from home. The ten years he spent there exposed him to a side of life and a cast of characters that would leave him with another set of enduring friendships and a fund of entertaining stories that appeared bottomless. It also meant that the always present but carefully masked larrikin streak in Dave's character was given free rein; not perhaps always wisely, but ever without malice and to the huge amusement of his kindred spirits. Professionally it was a difficult introduction to teaching, but he learned quickly and built a teaching philosophy that looked deceptively simple: 'teachers teach, kids learn'. As Ashgrove students would later learn, underlying this dictum was a whole set of assumptions about what was – and







what was not – acceptable behavior in his classes! He also claimed to have survived ten 'educational revolutions' in his time as a teacher by the simple device of ignoring the whole lot and getting on with his job!

In Murgon, Dave's personal life also blossomed. He met and married a fellow teacher, Anne Durrant. Their two sons Geoffrey and Gregory would receive their vigilant care and direction through infancy, schooling and young manhood, before forging professional careers of their own. In due course, Dave also became the proud and doting grandfather of three grandchildren and lavished care and attention on them. It was in fact the demands of their sons' education that caused Dave and Anne to move back to Brisbane. Posted to The Gap State High School, Dave sought with some difficulty to reintegrate to the demands of city life.

Fate intervened again, this time in the form of two Ashgrove stalwarts: Michael Gubbins and Brother Jack Alman. Alerted to Dave's considerable talents, both sought to make him 'an offer he could not refuse' in the form of joining the Ashgrove staff. Memory suggests that he needed remarkably little convincing, but this may be looking through rose-coloured glasses. Nevertheless, the deed was done and in 1984, Dave appeared for the first – but not the last – time in the 'Blue and Gold'. It was the beginning of an enduring partnership between Dave and the College that was to their mutual benefit and was ended only by his recent death.

As classroom teacher, then teacher librarian and finally archivist, Dave gave his all as a loyal and talented employee and it would be no exaggeration to say that his initiatives and activities became an integral part of the glue that bound the Ashgrove staff community. Whether as organiser of textbook distribution, unfailing deliverer of the Courier Mail, organised and disciplined teacher, editor of College and Old Boys' publications, passionate collector of College history and artifacts or supportive colleague, Dave threw himself into his job, revelled in its 'busy-ness' and added value to whatever he touched.

To get the true measure of the value of his contributions, one should however look far wider to all the 'extras' that Dave involved himself in. As the most avid of cricketers, it was an axiom that he would coach that sport and the Second XI in particular benefitted for many years from his knowledge and skills. (Anecdotally, Dave was also the hardest umpire in Christendom to persuade that an LBW appeal had merit!) Claiming from his years of Rugby League 'up the bush' that he knew nothing about the complexities of the 15 man game, he started out with junior Rugby teams but soon acquired expertise and was the long-term coach of the Fourth XV. This laid the foundation for many legendary encounters between Dave's Fourths and Derek's Third XV, aka 'Cameron v Cameron on Cameron'. Memory – again possibly faulty – says that only once was the lower team victorious. That day, Dave took the sage advice of his good mate Stanley Carr that the way to win was to play by the Maori Rules of Rugby (that is, none)! The results were not important for either coach – what was imperative was that each player be as skilled as possible, understand that there was no 'I' in the word 'team', and play the game for the fun it was obviously meant to be. The broad grins and camaraderie that marked training and games suggested that Dave achieved those laudable goals consistently. Nor was this the end of Dave's sterling work. His sons had possessed considerable athletic talents and it wasn't long before he was also involved passionately in Track and Field at the College. Many budding long and triple jumpers received wise counsel from Dave and his stalwart efforts combined with the athletes' talents to produce many memorable performances on each year's 'Big Day Out'. Fittingly he was also editor of the magnificent

history of Ashgrove Track and Field, "Passing the Baton" published last year. Dave 'the coach' Cameron thus also looms large in any attempt to capture the breadth of his achievements.

And yet it's only when we dig beneath this long list of positions and contributions that we can truly understand what 'made Dave tick': to leave the quantifiable and venture into the realm of the anecdote and the vignette. He was always welcoming, whether in the library, the book room or the archives, and the rank or status of the visitor was of no account to Dave – you were worthy of respect until your conduct or attitudes indicated otherwise! Provincials, Brothers, parents, teachers, school officers, services staff members and past or present students all entered Dave's orbit; to each, he extended respect, care, good humour and whatever skills he possessed to make your day easier or brighter. To anyone who was in distress, either professional or private, Dave offered counsel, care and support and he was the most loyal of friends. He did these things not because it was his job, but inherently – he cared about the world, his fellow travellers on the journey, and especially his Team, in the broadest sense of that word. His laconic quips about the various situations in which he was involved, often uttered tongue in cheek and with just the occasional dash of cynicism, rightly achieved legendary status.

To cope with the stresses of complex tasks and the added responsibilities of being a 'people person', Dave found both guidance and sustenance in routine. It probably didn't escape the notice of family, work mates and friends that he was the proverbial 'creature of habit'. You could set a watch by when he would appear and what he would do in any activity, as you could by the comments or quips that would greet anyone he met in the course of doing so. Whenever he found time for fishing (the great love of his recreational life) the routines adopted came close to driving his fellow anglers to distraction, so painstaking and repetitive were they. It should be noted that this did not stop rods falling off the roof of the car, or crab pots being thrown overboard without ropes attached – but at least Dave had theoretically taken precautions! Equally, Dave fancied himself from Murgon days as a horse whisperer able to divine the form guide and bet his way to endless riches. The reality was that every time he put a ticket into the TAB machine, it was another triumph of hope over experience.

Thus, Dave Cameron: husband, father, grandfather and brother; teacher, librarian, archivist and wordsmith; friend, coach, raconteur, humourist and larrikin; would-be slayer of fish and hopeless punter. Each of these vantage points offers clues to the measure of the man and their sum is a picture of a rich life, well lived. He was that enviable combination of a highly educated individual who never lost the common touch, a richly talented man who used those talents in a way that bettered the lives of others. We are all poorer now that he has been taken from us, too soon.

DR KEVIN VANDELEUR (1969) AWARDED ORDER OF AUSTRALIA

The entire Marist College Ashgrove Community was delighted when informed that Dr Kevin Vandeleur (1969) had been appointed as a Member of the Order of Australia (AM) in the Australia Day Honours List.

Whilst many of our members had assumed the award was for services to cricket, given the dynamic opening partnership 'Big Kev' and John Connolly established in 1969 (surely one of Ashgrove's greatest ever), Kev has achieved far more since then.

After completing ophthalmology training in 1983, Kev participated in post-graduate studies in Canada, USA, Italy, Switzerland and the United Kingdom. His primary interests include cataract, refractive surgery, vitreoretinal and retinal detachment surgery.

In addition to being one of Australia's leading ophthalmologists and a very proud Ashgrovian, Kev is renowned for his selfless philanthropic work in leading teams of volunteers (including fellow Old Boys) to remote areas of East Timor, Myanmar, Cambodia and Kiribati to perform crucial eye surgery on the poorest members of society.

Kev has informed the OBA that when attending Kirabati (180,000 people on an island near the equator) in the early days, they often visited a small Marist Father's Community. Kev then had the pleasure of 20 years of annual trips to Kiribati with the eye team supported by the Royal Australian College of Ophthalmology. As is the trait of all Ashgrove Old Boys, Kev is quick to acknowledge other Marist family members on the team including Dr Peter Stewart (Marist Old Boy) and Mr Bill Watson (whose sons Gus and George are currently at the College).

Kev was also one of many who have made a huge impact on eye care in East Timor. Kev emphasised to the OBA that we all owe a huge debt to the East Timorese for their selfless protection of troops escaping from Japanese occupation during World War II. Truer words were never spoken.

That group's focus from the start was to begin a program to train eye doctors from the local community. That was an ongoing commitment and the group ultimately have handed over some of the routine surgery to the locally trained doctors.

The team also made yearly trips to Myanmar (Burma) to provide cataract and retinal services. Other Australian teams also participated in volunteer services to this area.

An Ashgrove man always, Kev told the OBA, "Can I take this opportunity to offer a big thank you to Marist Brothers for the happy years at Ashgrove and a big hello to fellow mates whose company I enjoy when we catch up."

The Old Boys congratulate you Dr Kevin William Vandeleur AM. Your selfless service to others and your humility epitomises everything that is great about the incredible education and the guidance we all received from the Marist Brothers.


ASHGROVE CELEBRATES THE GOLDEN JUBILEE OF FATHER JOHN HOPKINSON (1963)

He has provided decades of service as a Marist Father in South America and is currently looking after the poorest in Bolivia.



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VALE GREG DUX (1964)

The Old Boys Community was greatly saddened to learn of the death of one of our true legends, Greg Dux (1964) on June 12, 2021. Gregory Lawrence Dux stands alone as the only Ashgrovian to be selected in the 'Team of the Century' in both Rugby and Cricket. Phenomenal! A wonderful man and deeply loved by the Ashgrove community.

Greg's Headmaster, Geoffrey Joy (Brother Phelan), wrote:

I was very saddened to hear of the death of Greg Dux.

He certainly was a marvellous school boy - in character, study, YCS, Cadets, rugby, cricket etc.

He was in the top tier of senior students I knew in fifty years around schools.

I join in prayers for Greg, his family & friends.

His great friend Henry Mendra (1965) also provided the Old Boys with the following tribute:

In 1964 Greg was the opening fast bowler for the Marist 1st XI, coached by Br. Phelan. Greg's mannerisms oozed confidence and purpose, he cast a large shadow. Noticeable to every batsman was the steel toecap on his right boot. As he marked out his run-up, the anxiety intensified on the face of the opening batsman. Maybe facing the first ball was not such a good idea after all. Those were the days when a batsman had pads, gloves, and bat to fend off the ball. There were no helmets, no body pads, and even a box was only optional. At the point of delivery, most often an inswinger of yorker length, a mighty grunt that even the deaf could hear, was let out. The steel capped right boot dragged along behind him, and helped arrest his follow through. Greg towelled up the opposition in quick time, and the runs required to win the match were



comfortably scored by the batsmen. That year the 1st XI went through the season undefeated, mainly due to Greg's prowess with the ball.

Greg, Peter and John Dux lived in a house adjacent to the sports oval which has now become the Brisbane Broncos home ground. In the '60s it was our playground. Sometimes we'd scratch together a team for a game of touch football - Greg and Peter Dux, Russell Hooper, Paul Simmons, myself, and a stray dog to even out the numbers. Greg played touch with a touch more vigour and enthusiasm than the rest of us.

Greg became a teacher and taught at Brisbane State High. However, his commitment to Marist Ashgrove remained firm as he took over the training of the school cadet band to shape it into one of the best school bands in Brisbane.

It is evident that Greg lived life to the full. Sadly he has now left us. But the memories will live on.

The Old Boys pass on their condolences to Greg's beloved wife, Sue, daughter Jane and son Paul; and also to Greg's four grandchildren and younger brothers, Peter (1966) and John (1969).

OLD BOYS RECOGNISE THE LIFE OF THE MAGNIFICENT NOEL JOSEPH CAVANAGH

It was another sad day when the Old Boys learned of the passing of Noel Cavanagh, a treasured member of that esteemed family which are so much the fabric of this College.

Brother Roger Burke wrote these words in honour of our great friend and colleague Noel Cavanagh.

What a charismatic man, husband, father, grandparent, Christian, true friend, adventurer, master story-teller, great party host, a person with a social conscience! What an illustration of a noble life that did so much good for others!

Noel grew up along Waterworks Road, within the Catholic Parish of St Finbarr's where he attended the Primary School before coming to St Mary's College Ashgrove, the fourth of the Cavanagh boys to do so. Ted was a foundation student (1940-1941). Harold and Keith would also precede Noel in attending Ashgrove. He was the first Cavanagh to go through to Senior (Year 12). Two more brothers, Brian and Paul, were to follow him at the College. Six boys at the College – is that some kind of record? Noel was the sixth child in a family of ten.

After Senior, and after a preparation of a mere three weeks, Noel set out to PNG on a career as a Cadet Patrol Officer – the launch of an adventure (20 years, 1956-1976) - arguably the highlight of his entire life. Noel relished in the contribution he could make to that country still under the jurisdiction of Australia, culminating when Noel was appointed the Acting District Commissioner for the Southern Highlands.

Along the way, the beautiful Genevieve became part of Noel's scene. Also from the Ashgrove neighbourhood, Genevieve went to school with Noel's younger sister Letitia. After Noel and Genevieve announced their engagement, they wrote to each other every day, both carefully filing all correspondence. Years later, on their 25th wedding anniversary, Noel presented Genevieve with a bound copy of all her letters to him.

After a short engagement, they married in 1968, and shared life together in PNG for eight (8) years before their return to Brisbane.

Noel next bought into a newsagency in Nambour and later worked in the Public Service. Then in 1988 Noel accepted the position of General Manager of the Tiwi Enterprises for the Aboriginal Association on Bathurst Island. The local community held him and his family in high regard, and testament to this was his acceptance into a Tiwi family. His bestowed title of 'Paraka' was used by his ten grandchildren for the rest of his life.

Noel's funeral Mass, concelebrated on January 29, 2021 by his classmate, Emeritus Bishop Brian Heenan, and Fr Bernie Gallagher, was a memorable ceremony and a triumph of a life lived with lovable passion. A younger Fr Brian Heenan had presided at the wedding of Noel and Genevieve in 1968.

At the funeral, beautiful eulogies were delivered by daughter Sarah (also on behalf of Genevieve), son Justin (1992) (also on behalf of his sister Tristan and her family in Doha), and Noel's cousin John Kenny (also on behalf of Noel's sister Letitia living in Lyon in France). His eldest daughter Ainslie and her family were also present at the funeral.

The symbols placed in the chapel for his funeral service said so much about Noel's life: rosary beads and Cursillo Pilgrim's Guide; his PNG Medal; and the Marist Old Boys shirt from the 75th Jubilee Year. He became a Life Member of the Old Boys Association in 1969, and would attend Reunions whenever possible. Noel was always proud of his College days at Ashgrove.

Noel made people believe in themselves! He will be long remembered by all those whose lives he touched.... his loving family and many friends.



MICHAEL J. P. BARRY (1960)

Michael J. P. Barry (60) attended MCA from 1952-60. It was with great sadness that the news headlines of November 6, 2020 announced:

"Respected surgeon and former national rugby union representative Dr Mick Barry has died after being pulled from the water on the Gold Coast. Ambulance crews were called to the beach near Currumbin Surf Life Saving Club just before 6am. A 78year old Miami man and five of his long-time friends had been for their daily swim. Once in the water they experienced a strong southerly pull in the water. Mick Barry may have suffered a medical episode. His friends and the ambulance attempted to give him CPR but he was unable to be revived."

The jungle drums started beating quickly and somehow Mick's school friends, Frank McDonnell (1960) and Paul O'Donnell (1959) realised the seriousness and had incredibly connected with Fr Jacob who gave Mick last rites on the beach. John McCaffery (60) had been a classmate of Mick's from Grade 1 at St Finbarr's to Grade 12 at MCA, and lived not far from Mick and his older brother Neville (1950,dec'd) in Glenlyon Drive, Ashgrove. John always thought Mick was the quintessential Ashgrovian, a perfect example of quality. John always

admired his character and was amazed at his sporting ability where his Athletics prowess stood out right from the beginning. "In his very first year at MCA in 1952 when at 9 years of age, he won the "Junior Mile" in grand style! Mick continued his run as underage Athletics Champion from U11 in 1953 to U13 in 1955. Mick had also placed second in the U12 Broad Jump at the Queensland Schoolboy Championships."

In his senior years, cricket and rugby were the sports he would excel in. Mick Barry was a member of the 1960 MCA 1st XI Cricket Team. He was also in the 1959 Undefeated Premiership Cricket 1st XI. In 1959, Mick was halfback in the undefeated 1st XV Rugby Premiership team. In the premiership winning 1960 1st XV, Mick was the best back and top try scorer. He represented the TAS representative side in both 1959 and 1960 against Combined GPS schools. The "Telegraph" reported on the match on July 30,1960:

"For the Associated Schools, halfback Mick Barry who ran from his own 25 to score a brilliant try was outstanding."

Dr Mick Barry was a retired Ear, Nose and Throat Specialist. Mick was a former three times premiership winning halfback for the Brothers Rugby Union Club. He played one Test for the Wallabies in 1971-the third Test against South Africa at the SCG, a series known for the anti-apartheid demonstrations. Mick was also Test reserve multiple times as he forever seemed in the shadow of those two great halfbacks- Ken Catchpole and John Hipwell. Mick still made two Wallaby tours -in 1968, to Ireland and Scotland, and in 1969 to South Africa.

Mick had made his first appearance for Queensland against New South Wales in 1966 and soon after played against the 1966 British Lions at Lang Park. In 1971, he was halfback when Queensland scored that remarkable 15-11 win at Ballymore over the British Lions. Later in his final season of 1971, he would also captain the Junior Wallabies against the Springboks. The South Africans smashed the Juniors 31-12! This was an abrasive game that had Barry sporting facial stitches, chipping the Springboks at the after match function for over-robust play. In 1971, Doctor Barry was a plus on many fronts-he had sowed a few chins with his dexterous stitching work! Mick Barry finished his magnificent Rugby career as a true icon of the game and his life reflected this- so highly regarded and loved by all!

The Old Boys have also recently been advised of the passing of Mick's beloved wife, Janelle.

The Old Boys offer sincere condolences to Mick and Janelle's, sons Andrew (dec'd), Shaun, Matt and daughter Liz.

DR BARRY WOOD (1962)

Dr Barry Wood (62): 'Woody' passed away peacefully on Tuesday night, May 25, 2021, after a 'brave fight' with cancer. Barry was the much-loved husband of 50 years to Beris Lorraine, and adored by his three daughters, Lisa, Katherine, and Jacqueline and four grandchildren. Barry and his family had resided at their property at Pinjarra Hills for the past 47 years. Barry's Funeral Mass was on Thursday June 3, 2021, at Our Lady of the Rosary Catholic Church, Kenmore.

Woody lived with his parents and sister, Loretta and brother, Brian in Stewart Road and attended Marist Ashgrove. He was a fine Rugby player and played in the undefeated premiership winning 3rd XV (1961) and 2nd XV (1962). Barry was adept at scoring tries and the 1961 B&G reported: "the now typical try by Barry Wood brought the final score to 8-0."

Errol Allan (63) provided the following kind words:

"Dr. Barry Wood (Woody) was Professor of Chemistry and chief scientist at the University of Queensland for many years until his retirement in February 2020. Barry recently showed me the UQ Certificate presented to him by the Vice-Chancellor when he retired. This certificate stated that Dr Barry Wood was the longest serving UQ Academic Staff member since UQ at St Lucia started in the 30s! Woody was employed by UQ for 53 years until his retirement last year.

We will all miss his contagious and playful character which always brought such joy to his family and his old school and rugby mates. Barry was such a nice person-one of the good guys!"

DESMOND KEITH BURKE (1954)

The youngest of the four Burke boys prominent at Ashgrove in the ten years following the War – Brian (1949), Kevin (1949), Raymond (1953) and Desmond (1954) – passed away on 9 December 2020, at the age of 82. Des spent the first 20 or more years of his life in the family home at Ashgrove before moving into a high-rise Unit in George Street Brisbane overlooking Parliament House.

Des left school at the end of Junior (the present-day Year 10) as most students did in those days. He had a number of casual jobs in Brisbane before being employed as a travelling salesman for a Sydney company whose main business were neckties, corporate scarves and fashion accessories like cuff-links. He travelled all over Queensland in this work.

Des the adventure-loving overseas traveller was our best description for him. His first trip was to the Olympic Games in Melbourne 1956 at the age of 18, followed by a trip to the Rome Olympics 1960. These were the forerunners to a countless number of times to all parts of the world, to every continent, even to the South Pole. Just a few years ago he managed four overseas trips in the one year. He often travelled with his life-long friend Paz who lived down Sunnybank way. He always returned to Brisbane with a profound knowledge of the places visited.

Des never married, and lived on his own in Central Brisbane. He was an avid reader of the daily newspapers, and had a great love of Rugby League. Some of his visits to the heart-land of League in North of England were like pilgrimages for him. One of his return trips was featured in the British Press.


Des' funeral Mass was led by the Marist College Ashgrove Chaplain, Fr Jim Hargrave, before his interment with his parents, Henry and Marion, at the Pinnaroo Cemetery, Albany Creek.

PETER MICHAEL SCOTT (1953)

Peter hailed from a well-known family (4 girls, 2 boys) living in Glenlyon Drive, Ashgrove. The second of the Scott boys to come to St Mary's College Ashgrove, following on from his older brother Neil (1950) (who died less than a year ago), Peter completed the whole course of schooling at the College, Year 4 to Senior. Upon leaving school in the early 50s, Peter obtained a position with the Valuer's General Department where he was to spend the rest of his working life.

Married to Shirley, with two children – Stephen and Michael – Peter spent the best part of his working life, since 1961, in the suburb of Chelmer. The family were staunch members of the Christ the King Parish, Graceville, from where it was fitting that both Shirley (2018) and Peter were farewelled at Requiem Masses.

Peter had a great love for sport, a passion no doubt fostered by his dad Mick and his own participation in the various teams at the College. His sister Marie remembers Peter essentially as a sporting man. He represented the College in the 1st XI Cricket for two years, and is remembered as a stylish left-hand



batsman. Upon leaving school, Peter played one season with Wests Rugby Club, and then turned to his great love, Rugby League, where he played full back for the Brothers Club for a few years. He also played cricket for Valleys. After retirement, Peter took up golf, playing every Saturday for the next 20 years. During all of this time, he would never miss his fortnightly meet-ups with his former mates from work at a hotel in the city.

Let his sister Marie have the last say: Peter was a good man, a decent chap, a great bloke, gentle – a real gentleman in the true sense of the word (as was his brother Neil) – simple in his tastes, contented, always ready for a laugh, a loyal and good husband, a good and proud father of Stephen and Michael, and a good brother to Nora, Kathleen, Patty and myself. In her eulogy for Peter, Marie said that Peter was a person of determination, fortitude and forbearance.


Please pray for the following who have deceased recently.

Barry was also very active in the MCA Old Boys' Association, serving as Vice-President and representing the Association at the International Federation of Marist Ex-students Convention in Germany and France.

Tony Francis Prain (1963), late of Albion, passed away on 28 March 2021 aged 74 following a long battle with Parkinson's Disease. It was with sadness and gratitude that the seminary community farewelled Br Roger Burke who retired as a valued and much-loved member of the formation teaching staff at Holy Spirit Seminary.

For more than a decade, Br Roger introduced seminarians from across the Province of Queensland and beyond into the beautiful and sometimes mysterious world of Latin.

Initially only taught for one year, since 2016 the seminary has included two years of Latin language as part of its formation program. This was at the special request of the 2016 batch of propaedeutic students, and the tradition has continued ever since.

In introducing students to Latin, Br Roger drew on a long career teaching in Marist Schools across Australia where he eventually served also as

principal. Seminary students appreciated the insight that Br Roger brought to the Latin classes, reminding us often that a better understanding of Latin will also assist in securing a better understanding and appreciation of the English language.

In addition to his Latin classes, Br Roger also offered English lesson tutorials to many students. These were particularly welcomed by seminarians from overseas and those encountering tertiary level studies for the first time as they benefited from Br Roger's previous roles as an English teacher in schools as well as his spiritual and theological insights.
