PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Dear Fellow Old Boys,

Welcome to the final edition of The Ashgrovia for 2023. It has been a great year for the Old Boys as we celebrated many events together. 2023 again saw further strengthening of our ties with the College. This is only possible due to the tireless efforts of the Old Boys on the committee and the executive who have taken up the many challenges presented this year with presence and courage. We saw this especially with the OBA's adaptability, with so many major constructions underway around the college and being without our beloved Cyprian Pavilion. It is wonderful for the MCA OBA to work so cooperatively to help implement the College's masterplan which will greatly benefit future generations of students.

The OBA is looking to revitalise the Association and increase the relevance to all of our past students, with some exciting new initiatives on the horizon for the coming year- watch this space. All Old Boys are keenly watching the progress of the wholesale renovations occurring with the Cyprian Pavilion upgrade. As we wait with much interest for the project's completion, Old Boys will be excited to know that the College has approved the proposal for a new Sports Honour Board to be located there. Creating a new Sports Honour Board for the Cyprian Pavilion, titled "Old Boy National Representatives," will also include Old Boys who have represented other nations, as well as Australia in their particular sports. To be included on this Honour Board, all representatives must satisfy extensive criteria for selection.

On this new board, it is proposed that the sports will be listed in an ordered fashion, such that the effect will be impressive and maximise the sporting reputation of the College. Under each sport the names will be listed chronologically, and their last year attending the College inserted. Space will be provided to cater for future additions in terms of individuals or other sports.

The existing Sports Honour Board in the Champagnat Centre (Gym) foyer will be retained. As it is full, a replacement board will be created for additional names to be added, so the College can continue the same tradition there of recording representatives chronologically into the future."

We saw many well-supported events including the OBA Sports Day, with teams from Years 1953, 1963, 1973, and 1983 returning to watch the MCA 1st XV, and several Old Boy fathers even presenting their sons' jerseys on the day. Other events, including the Marist Vintage Lunch (for those old boys who had left school more than 40 years ago) and the annual Golf Day, were also outstanding successes. The OBA also continued to support various College activities, including the Green Ash Program, the Marist Tower Art Show, and the Marist Card Days. The standout for me personally was Super Reunion Day, which was timed to coincide with the Champagnat Trust Sports Lunch and the Boarding Parents Weekend. Nearly 400 Old Boys joined us for the day at the BBQ area beside the Cyprian Pavilion, sharing a cleansing ale and some tall tales as they reminisced about their time in the Blue and Gold.

Finally, I would like to extend my thanks to the Executive of the Old Boys and the committee we have had this year and on behalf of the OBA to the Head of College, Mr Michael Newman, the Deputy Head of College, Mr Charles Brauer, and Director of Public Relations, Mrs Bethany Halpin, as well as the entire College staff for their ongoing support. I wish to welcome the Year group of 2023 who have faced their own challenges this year in many ways, learning some hard life lessons throughout their final year. You have banded together and forged many strong friendships at Marist College Ashgrove that I'm sure will last you a lifetime.

FROM THE HEAD OF COLLEGE

Dear Marist College Ashgrove Old Boys and Marist Confreres,

There is no doubt that Marist College Ashgrove has always been focused on a values-based education. These values are quintessentially shaped in the Catholic faith and expressed through the Marist charism created by Marcellin Champagnat. So many wonderful Marist Brothers and lay teachers have graced this College with their practical application, natural infiltration, and explicit teaching of these values over time. Having lived and been formed by the Marist Brothers for some 18 years, I've come to know well the values of many past Marist College Ashgrove Brothers who gave their heart and soul to the education of young people and wouldn't hear a bad word said about this place. I personally feel a great sense of debt, but also a responsibility to keep alive the vision and values they strongly instilled at the College.



This is all despite a society that continues to become more secular today. The challenges a Catholic school, like Marist College Ashgrove, faces today due to this more secular world in which we live are growing exponentially. The challenges start with the limited understanding of our Catholic faith by many of our students today, to a lack of understanding of the culture and life of the Catholic school throughout history, to at times a contradiction of values from our new entrants to the College, as reflected in society.

Last holidays, I was reminded of this fact when viewing the launch of a new book about how to be happy. The key to happiness, they said, was to be satisfied with your lot in life and to stop wanting more. At first glance this seemed a good and noble idea to espouse, to create a sense of happiness. However, on further reflection, I realised that this idea was only an old idea packaged in a new secular format. The basic ideal of Buddhism is that you can only reach enlightenment when you stop desiring. Christians in turn, speak of happiness as being "poor in spirit". The authors, however, were so proud that they had discovered this seemingly new idea on how to be happy, but really the values of the Catholic Church and other religions have already explained this wisdom for us in their teachings and writings. We just need to continue recontextualising our story for modern society.

Now, with the many wonderful Old Boys of the College, we aim to continue this traditional values-based education. The legacies and the values you espouse, we wish to live into the future of this great college. We are proud to trace your footsteps in the classrooms, facilities, verandas, music rooms, playing grounds, and ovals to continue to experience these values of the Catholic faith through the Marist charism into a new paradigm of teaching and learning for the boys in our care. When a boy walks through the gates of Marist for the last time, I hope it is said that they are young men with the spirit of the Catholic faith, with Mary as guide acting simply, modestly, and living humble lives, working hard to make the world a better place.

We acknowledge our young men of Year 12 who are finishing up at the College as we speak – our newest Old Boys! We wish them well for their future and recommend them to our world as "good Christians and good citizens" (Saint Marcellin Champagnat).

I sincerely congratulate the Old Boys on this stimulating publication, and I sincerely thank the positive and hard-working Old Boys Committee of Dom Melrose (President), Tim Slack (Secretary), Bret Ambrose (Treasurer), Steve McAuliffe (Vice-President), and the very enthusiastic and generous John O'Hare.

In **Tennis**, the College's 1st IV finished third in a tight contest with SLC, where matches finished 4-4, but Lauries won on sets. The 8Bs were premiers and MCA was second in the aggregate. Congratulations to St Peter's on their premiership.

In **Rugby League**, the 1st XIII were third overall and second in the aggregate. Villa and Padua shared the premiership. MCA's Seconds, 10A and 9As finished first in their division.

The AIC **Touch** Carnival at Runcorn and Water Polo Carnival at Ashgrove were held on October 21 and 22, respectively. Ashgrove's Open Touch team exceeded expectations to win their pool and progress to the grand final, where Iona were declared premiers. The College's Year 8/9 team made amends, winning their division after the hooter, 5-4! Head of Sport, Derek Lennon convened a bevy of coaches for the 10 teams participating across all primary and secondary age groups.

In **Water Polo**, MCA entered teams in the three divisions, Year 7, 8/9 and Opens. Year 8/9 were undefeated in their 3 matches as was MCA's premier Open team who finished as the only unbeaten College with impressive performances against SPLC (10-0), Villa (7-3) and Padua (11-4), and claimed the AIC title and again defended their Qld All Schools trophy. Ryan Apps, Ms Grace Ryan and Will Valentine provided the expert coaching for MCA.

The 2023 AIC **E-Sports** Competition was again held at Villanova. MCA won the inaugural competition held at Villanova College in 2022, but were unable to defend their AIC title but remained in contention throughout the tournament. Villanova defeated St Laurence's College in this year's final. E-Sports is a growing league that encourages teamwork, problem-solving and communication through organised video games and is becoming increasingly popular in schools all over the world. This year the teams played capture the flag in Minecraft, with round-robin matches in the morning, moving into finals after lunch. Ms Justine Natoli coached and coordinated our E-sports teams.



NINE IN A ROW! MCA WIN AIC TRACK AND FIELD AGAIN IN 2023

This year's AIC Track and Field team victory was a culmination of a journey starting the day after Marist's championship win in 2022. Our representative season was perhaps the most successful in Marist history winning the National Schools Challenge, 13 QLD representatives, 11 State Medals and 6 National Medals. Plus a strong contingent medalling at Met North titles in 2023 and moving on to Schools State Titles in 2023 at the time of writing.

The Marist AIC Championships team performance in 2023 left many in the coaching team as well as those connected to the program speechless. In winning the 9th AIC Senior title in a row, this Marist team has created new history and surpassed many of the incredible Track and Field squads seen from Marist in the 1970s-1980s where Marist saw 2 separate groups win 5-6 consecutive titles in that time (1978-1982/1984-1989). The current win connects teams all the way back to 2015 and we spoke of "legacy" at our recent camp linking athletes/coaches/supporters across the years who have supported the Track and Field community on this historic journey.

The final points had Marist with 4 age group trophies (13, 14, 15, 16 Years), plus two 3rd places in Opens and 12 Years. This was a Marist team performance for the ages putting an exclamation mark on Marist having one of the strongest school athletic programs in Australia. The points gap to 2nd placed Padua was as high as seen in recent years with a 183.5 point win.

Our Primary squad was not to be outdone and with an incredibly deep Year 5 group committed to the Marist cause and a hardy Year 6, both years won their Year level trophies, culminating in winning the aggregate. Mr John Lambourne should be congratulated for his work in winning their 3rd consecutive AIC Junior trophy.

Thanks to Head Coach Mr Rob Martin (1989) for his support and dedication to all Marist athletes throughout this successful 2023 season. His extraordinary knowledge and technical capability, the amount of hours he commits to making the program the best it can be, his passion for the sport, and his genuine care and commitment to the students have created a wonderful program and a competitive culture.

We are very fortunate to benefit from the guidance of Director of Track and Field, Richard Graham and the a coaching team like no other at school including: Old Boy coaches – Mr Rob Martin (Head Coach), Mr Will Burkett, Mr Zack Newsham, Mr Dan Drew, Mr Carl Martin, Mr Tom Prole, Mr David Meehan and Mr Bill Prole (Head of Distance); College Coaches – Ms Maddie Spann, Ms Eli Kenny, Mr Andrew Fogarty, Mr Laurie Boustead and Mr Paul Knight; External Coaches – Mr Eric Brown (Head of Jumps), Mr Des Davis (Head of Throws), Mr Paul Kearney, Mr Tim Castley, Mr Cameron Pfeffer, Mr Brendan Saunders, Mr Gav Hunter, Mr Connor Duggan and Mr Jeremy Davis.

Thanks to our team co-captains James Prole and Lee Martin plus supporting vice captains Joel Drew and George Daly. All 4 were QLD representatives leading with distinction and high performance along with many of their Year 12 open team members who leave Marist having never been defeated at the AIC championships.

Marist has now won 9 AIC titles in a row which is unprecedented, and the team look forward to defending our title in 2024 seeking a historic 10th victory.

Also receiving a Queensland Great Award is Australian Rugby League icon, Steve Renouf, father of MCA Old Boys Sam (2010), Billy (2011) and Charlie (2016).



CHARLIE CAMERON (2011) - ALL-AUSTRALIAN

Brisbane Lions forward, Charlie Cameron (2011) has been rewarded for a standout season by being named in the AFL All-Australian team at the AFL Awards on August 30, 2023. The electrifying goalkicker booted an impressive 53 majors earning his second All-Australian blazer, after first receiving the honour in 2019.

Charlie was drafted in 2014, and returned to his home state in 2018, after four seasons at the Adelaide Crows. In 2017, Charlie scored a late consolation goal for the Crows when they were defeated by Richmond in the GF played at the MCG before over 100,000 spectators.

Charlie Cameron has been the Brisbane Lions leading goalkicker for the past five seasons. At the completion of the 2023 final series, Charlie has now played 202 AFL games and scored 359 goals. Charlie's late goal in the 2023 AFL Grand Final appeared to have won the game for the Brisbane Lions, but Collingwood snatched the match at the death to win by four points in a thriller! Charlie recorded three fine majors in the GF which were applauded by once again, more than 100,000 spectators. In 2019, he earned All-Australian honours for the first time! In 2023, Charlie was the sole Brisbane Lion player to receive this accolade. Always an Aussie Rules fan-favourite, Charlie's iconic motorbike handlebar celebration gets the Gabba roaring as does his signature song, "Take me home country road!"



EMOSI TUQIRI (2017) - FIJI WORLD CUP CALL-UP

Congratulations to Emosi Tuqiri (2017) on his selection for the Fiji World Cup squad at the 2023 Rugby World Cup played in France in Sept/October. Emosi was rewarded with a callup to the Fijian national squad as a replacement for the injured Jone Koroiduadua. Emosi was a disappointing omission when the original team was announced but returned to Brisbane, continued training and set his goals for next season. Emosi played for the Fijian Drua in Super Rugby this year after previously playing for the Melbourne Rebels. Emosi is a cousin of dual international, Lote Tuqiri. Fiji advanced to the quarter-finals at the expense of the Wallabies who they defeated 22-15 in their pool match.



RAY MEAGHER (1963) - LOGIES CONTENDER AGAIN

Sixty years ago, Ray Meagher was the 1963 School Captain, Sportsman of the Year, 1st XI Captain, 1st XV Captain, Captain of Athletics and member of the Swimming and Tennis teams. Ray represented Queensland in Rugby Union in 1968. Following his rugby career he has had a brilliant film and TV career. The following is an interview from the Sunday Mail on July 30, 2023 titled:

SHOWBIZ- "He ain't Alf glad to be nominated for another gong"

Australian television's 'night of nights' will see glitz, glamour, and a number of famous Queenslanders be rewarded for their contribution to Aussie TV, including Queensland screen icon, Ray Meagher.

Nominated for the prestigious Silver Logie, the 78-year-old actor from Roma remains humble about his long and successful career.

Meagher is no stranger to the Logies, having previously won the Gold Logie in 2010 and earned another Gold Logie nomination in 2022, while receiving seven nods for most popular actor for his portrayal of Alf Stewart.

When congratulated on his nomination, Meagher modestly dismissed his individual recognition, saying, "it's more of a compliment to the show than it is to me." He further praised his colleagues, stating that the young cast members work hard to make the show a success and that his nomination is "really a credit to everybody."

Reflecting on the enduring success of Home and Away, Meagher admitted he wasn't sure it continues to resonate with viewers. "If I knew that I'd leave now and write one myself," he said. However, he attributed the show's longevity to strong storylines, great crew, and "a few actors who don't fall over the furniture."

On his journey from a remote part of Queensland to become one of Australia's most recognised actors, Meagher credits his elder brother Colin for influencing him after their parents passed away at a young age.

"His values, his sense of fair play. Just everything about the guy I admired," he said, expressing how these traits have helped form his own attitude and contributed to his success. As for his Logies night routine, Meagher admitted that he's planning on "keeping it simple," revealing he would be wearing "just a suit" he found in a wardrobe. Despite acknowledging that the awards night can seem to take forever, he expressed excitement about this year's host, Sam Pang, praising him as a "lovely bloke." What an icon is Ashgrove's legend, Ray Meagher!

Sam then proceeded to swim the 4th fastest time in history (3:40.60) to take the gold by 0.1 seconds. Breathtaking stuff! Sam also won the silver medal in the 800m and bronze in the 1500m. Congratulations to Sam.

As a capable freestyler and breaststroker, Berehulak found that his swimming background lent speed to his water polo gameplay, a crucial asset in the water.


Inspiration to reach the pinnacle of water polo in Australia came from various quarters – his parents, junior coaches at the Brisbane Barracudas Water Polo Club, and iconic figures like Pietro Figlioli (2001), whose career Berehulak had followed closely. Figlioli's transition from swimming to water polo mirrored Berehulak's own, serving as a beacon of what could be achieved.

The camaraderie and connections formed during his time at Marist College have endured, with fellow alumni like Will Valentine (2021) sharing both personal and professional bonds with Berehulak. With busy schedules, it is difficult to keep in contact with other notable athletes like Sam Short, but the mutual respect remains, with Berehulak acknowledging Short's recent accomplishments in swimming.

Berehulak's aspirations include not only immediate goals such as representing Australia in the Paris 2024 Olympics but also long-term objectives like playing professionally overseas and eventually returning to Brisbane. Concurrently, he's preparing for life beyond water polo with a degree in psychology, ensuring a well-rounded future.

To aspiring athletes and students at Marist Ashgrove, Berehulak's advice is grounded in the philosophy of enjoyment and effort. Success, he believes, is rooted in passion for one's pursuits and the willingness to fully commit to them. He encourages students to embrace a range of experiences, put forth their utmost effort, and set clear goals to achieve their fullest potential.

Berehulak's story is not just about individual triumph but also about how formative environments and supportive communities shape one's journey. From the swimming pools of Marist College Ashgrove to the world championship arenas, Berehulak's narrative is a testament to the fact that with passion, hard work, and a willingness to seize every opportunity, one can transcend the ordinary and make a splash on the world stage.



SEAN O'BRIEN (2001) - AUSTRALIAN WINDSURFING CHAMPION

Sean O'Brien's journey from a young windsurfer to an Australian champion is a story of dedication and perseverance. Starting at the tender age of 5 under his father's tutelage, Sean's talent was evident early on. His schooling at Marist College Ashgrove honed his skills, and upon graduating in 2001, he pursued further education, obtaining a dual degree in Psychology and Biomedical Science at the University of Queensland. His passion for windsurfing and media design dovetailed into a successful career and the creation of his media design agency, 'Brisbane Agency'.

The waters called him back, and Sean's prowess on the windsurfing board led him to clinch 11 Australian Windsurfing Titles between 2002 and 2018, becoming the most decorated Australian windsurfer in history. His accolades include being ranked 7th in the world in Formula Windsurfing in 2012 and winning the Australian Olympic Windsurfing Class Title in 2007, propelling him into the Australian Olympic Squad for Sailing.

A turn of fate with an injury in 2007 altered his Olympic dreams, but Sean shifted his focus to event organisation, bringing to life successful championships in Australia. His expertise also saw him coaching young Australian talent for the ISAF Youth World Championships.

Sean's competitive spirit took him to Europe, Asia, and the UK, competing in prestigious events such as the PWA World Tour and the IFCA World Championships, with a European base in Poland. His approach to competition is methodical, focusing on immediate goals like making finals before aiming for the top of the PWA leaderboard.

From the classrooms of Marist College Ashgrove to becoming a dynamic figure in international windsurfing, Sean's legacy is a testament to setting goals and achieving them, an inspiration that will resonate for generations.



JEREMY RIGBY (1987) - TRAMPOLINE CHAMPION


Jeremy Rigby's journey from a budding trampolinist to a multi-faceted professional is a narrative of remarkable versatility. An Ashgrove alumnus, his trampolining prowess shone through early with a bronze medal at the World Age Trampoline Titles in 1981. Post-graduation, Jeremy led the Queensland and Australian Age Trampoline Teams, achieving significant success, including a second place in men's power tumbling at the 1988 World Age Games in the USA and serving as the Queensland Tumbling State coach.

Transitioning from sports, Jeremy found his calling in the Queensland Railways and the creative realm of film. His talents as a writer and producer have seen his documentary work showcased internationally, including at the Pyongyang International Film Festival.

A key figure in Brisbane's film community, Jeremy co-founded the Australia Independent Film Festival, which is fast gaining global prestige and is backed by Brisbane City Council and Screen Queensland, among others. This year, the festival introduces 'SEQ Future Stars', a new category for high school filmmakers, which will be judged by industry experts and community leaders. Bart Mellish MP is confirmed as an adjudicator for this innovative session.

BR NEVILLE'S HONORARY LIFE MEMBERSHIP AWARD

We're pleased to share a reprint of the touching speech given recently by Tony Hogarth (1976), honouring Br Neville's Honorary Life Membership award. Through Tony's words, experience the warmth and respect for a valued member of our community. Enjoy the read.

It is an honour and privilege to be asked to say a few words on behalf of the Old Boys Association, for its newest inductee as an Honorary Life Member of the Marist College Ashgrove Old Boys Association, Brother Neville Solomon F.M.S..

50 years ago, this year, Neville Solomon, having just graduated from University, was appointed by Brother Alexis Turton, as a lay teacher at the College, for his first teaching role. Strong in the Arts, Neville taught French, English and History. He was also an accomplished musician, and involved in the College Cadet Corps. When Cadets ended, Neville continued to foster the remnants of the Cadet Band, which morphed into the first College Band. As Graham Lawson reminisced, this was probably the beginning of the College's spectacular Music Department of today. Staff of that era, recall Nev enthusiastically playing the piano at end of term and year staff functions and of course he regularly played the organ in Masses at the College.

It was my pleasure to be taught the French language for two years by Neville, in Years 9 and 10. It remains one of my scholastic regrets that I didn't continue studying that subject to Year 12; especially when later visited France and I realised how little of the French language I actually knew. Nev was a highly accomplished teacher. He had a lot of energy and was well-liked by the boys. The boys in those days, being astute observationists, gave Neville the handle, 'Nifty Nev'; as he was a snappy dresser and moved with intent. In 1976, when the senior student cohort finished Year 12, I'm told Brother Alexis announced to the staff 'he and Neville were to leave the College; and that Nev, intended to become a Marist Brother'. There was one minor hiccup, Neville, a devout Anglican, had to be received into the Catholic Faith first. He duly was, and the rest is history.

Neville taught at and held numerous roles at Marist Colleges in Australia. In 2003, Neville (by now of course, Brother Neville), returned to Marist College Ashgrove, this time, as Headmaster of the College. He had come full circle, from his commencement as a first-year teacher, to Marist Brother and Headmaster of this great College. He remained Headmaster until the end of 2008, during which time he was highly supportive of the OBA and the various other institutions within the College. He was, to this point in time, the last Marist Brother to be Headmaster at the College and succeeded of course by Mr Peter McLoughlin.

After 2008, Neville took on the role of Formator at Our Lady of The Hermitage in France; the spiritual home of the Marist Order and from where it all began with Marcellin Champagnat. It was here, with my son Tom, also an Old Boy of the College, and student during Brother Neville's time as Headmaster, reconnected with Brother Neville. We stayed for several days at The Hermitage. During this time, we received first-hand, the benefit of Nev's passion for and knowledge



of history, particularly Marist history. He took us to Marcellin's birth place, where Marcellin grew up as a boy, the location of the miracle attributed to Marcellin, the Cathedral, in Lyon, where he was Ordained, and finally, the room in which Marcellin died. All the while, Neville talked about Marcellin, the man, his life, his work, and inspirations for founding the Marist Orders. This was a living history lesson, and for me, cemented my understanding of the wonderful Marist Ethos. Nev was brilliant!

Neville later returned to Australia and is currently a member of the Star of the Sea Province, based in Rosalie, Brisbane. He has held many significant roles within the Marist Order in Australia, France, and Rome as well as significant roles within the Church generally.

He has never forgotten his formative and further years at the College. In total, Neville has spent 16 years of his life at the College. He has always had a passion and deep commitment for education, in the Marist tradition, and the welfare of the boys he has taught, tutored or mentored at the College. Neville has always held a place in his heart for Ashgrove and strongly supported the OBA in its efforts to foster relationships among Old Boys and the benevolent support work its members do for the College. Brother Neville Solomon is undoubtedly a worthy recipient of the Honour to be bestowed upon him today.

I kindly ask for Brother Neville to come forward to be presented with the Honorary Life Membership Certificate of Marist College Ashgrove Old Boys Association, by Mr Dominic Melrose, President of the Marist College OBA.

Isaac is MCA's third ordained Old Boy priest in the past five years with Fr Tom Zaranski (2004) and Fr Tom Duncan (2011) ordained in 2018 and 2019 respectively.

Isaac shared his personal story with the boys in the homily which follows, which included him being expelled from the secondary school in Year 9 and the disappointment of his parents. Isaac spoke about a prayer that he had learnt at Marist that he often recited in the difficult times of his youth, including a second expelling from a bayside state school in Year 10 in 2002. From his time at MCA, he took away this meaningful prayer that meant a lot to him - the Sub Tuum. His dream at the time was to play for the Brisbane Lions and to graduate wearing the iconic Marist Ashgrove blazer which the College Captain Joseph Lewis presented to him as a keepsake at the Assumption Day Mass. Isaac wore the blazer to the Vintage Lunch one week later!

Please enjoy the homily from Fr Isaac Falzon.

The very last time I was here at Marist College Ashgrove I was about 14 years old and I was standing outside the boarding dorm Br Geoffrey House, near the roundabout. It was about 10:00am and a very hot day. I stood there sweating, literally and metaphorically, because I had just been expelled and was waiting for a cab to pick me up and take me back home. Sadly, this wasn't the only time I was to be expelled either.

This expulsion was the result of many things: bullying, depression, anxiety, partying. But most of all it was the result of a war that was raging inside my heart and the fact that I felt like I couldn't reach out and share this experience with anyone.

My only two aspirations in life were to play AFL for the Brisbane Lions, and to wear that iconic blue blazer out of this very hall on graduation day. As good as those dreams were for me at that time they never came true because they were not experiences that I was meant to enjoy. God had other plans and a different path for my life.

These feelings of rage, resentment, and sadness were something I dealt with over the next 16 years of my life. But in those dark and scary moments there was always something I could lean on, there was always hope – because there always is. The glimmer of hope for me in my darkest moments were these words: “Sub tuum praesidium confugimus, Sancta Dei Genetrix. Nostras deprecationes ne despicias in necessitatibus, sed a periculis cunctis libera nos semper, Virgo gloriosa et benedicta. Amen. - WE fly to your patronage, O holy Mother of God; despise not our petitions in our necessities, but deliver us always from all dangers, O glorious and blessed Virgin. Amen.

This school song that is always sung with such fire and passion. Was sung sometimes as a song of victory, sometimes to taunt our enemies at a swimming carnival or rugby game, and sometimes just to show mateship and brotherhood. This song – this war cry - this prayer – is the oldest known prayer to our Mother Mary known to humanity which dates back to around the year 250. And it is exactly that - a song – a war cry – and most importantly a prayer.

Now, why would I share a story like that about myself on a day like today? Well, it's because today in our Gospel reading we encounter a beautiful story about two women who shared their experience with one another. The first

being Mary, the Mother of God who visits her relative Elizabeth, who is also pregnant with John the Baptist. This encounter between these two remarkable women highlights the significance and impact that sharing our experiences with one another has in our journeys, especially our faith journeys.

As Mary and Elizabeth greet each other and start to share their experiences of miraculous pregnancies they are reminded that their lives are not solely for themselves but are connected through God's divine plan. Just as Mary's "yes" to the angel's message brought about the Incarnation - brought about the son of God – Jesus. Elizabeth's child leapt in her womb at the sound of Mary's voice. Here in this moment, it symbolises the connection that occurs when we share our joys and sorrows with one another, revealing to others, and ourselves a deeper understanding of the presence of God in our lives.

The lesson that this Gospel is giving us today is that when we reach out and share our experiences with one another, truthfully and honestly, we can learn from each other's experience and grow as more authentic men. And when this is done through the eyes of faith it provides an avenue for freedom and love to exist in those darkened areas of our life. Breaking us free from those chains that hold us back.

In a world often marked by individualism and isolation, this gospel story about Mary and Elizabeth's encounter serves as a powerful example of the blessings that come from community and connection. Just as Elizabeth exclaimed, "Blessed are you among women, and blessed is the fruit of your womb!" we too are called to be blessings to one another. One way that we can do this is by looking after our mates, asking if they are alright and speaking about our experiences. Especially the ones of faith, hope, and love.

Brothers, there is a lot that can tear men down in this world and none are more brutal than ourselves.

May we be inspired by the bond between Mary and Elizabeth, and may their example remind us that fostering positive connections and building positive relationships leads us closer to God. Through our shared stories, we can truly encounter God and God's abundant grace which is offered to each one of us.

A single act of pure love (like asking if your mates ok, and listening to them) pleases God more than a thousand imperfect prayers.



2023 MARIST OLD BOYS VINTAGE LUNCH

On Friday 18 August over 150 people attended the annual Marist Vintage Lunch held in the MCA Boarders' Dining Room, with many also attending Mass in the College Chapel immediately preceding lunch.

We were fortunate to have newly ordained MCA Old Boy, Fr Isaac Falzon (1997-2002) celebrate Mass with College Chaplain, Fr Alatini Kolofou'ou sm. The first reading was read by Br Alexis (Headmaster 1971-76) while Marist Rosalie Old Boy Br Adrian Story read the second reading. Br Neville Solomon (Headmaster 2003-08) was our organist and cantor. Marist Brothers Community Leader Br Daniel Hollamby (1969) was our altar attendant and was joined in the Prayer of Intercession readings by Br Roger Burke (1953), Peter McLoughlin (Headmaster 2009-2020), Geraldine Knapp, Graham Lawson, Stan Macionis (1965, Rosalie), Kieran McCormack (1963), Chris Muir (1968), Jim Johnson (1968), Rob Ferguson (1973), Joe Podobnik (1973) while Richard Ward, Kay Wells and Peter Murdoch officiated in the Offertory Procession. HISTORY OF AFL AT MCA - 1996 TO 2023

In July of 2023, the Brisbane Lions claimed their eighth consecutive victory in a thrilling match against the West Coast Eagles at the Gabba, but the highlight of the day was a different kind of reunion on the Gabba Trust verandah. It was a gathering of the original Ashgrove Eagles, a team formed amid controversy back in 1996, marking a pivotal moment in the school's sports history.

The establishment of an Aussie Rules team at Ashgrove, a school with a history steeped in rugby, was initially met with disbelief. However, thanks to the unwavering efforts of Jim Tracy, who spearheaded the movement with petitions and gathered support from the senior students, the Ashgrove Eagles came into being in 1996, with Tracy as their inaugural coach.

Comprising predominantly rugby players with limited Aussie Rules experience, the initial Eagles squad, led by Michael Levens, exhibited a raw passion and tenacity that saw them clinch the minor premiership in division two of the Queensland Independent Schools Competition. Although they did not secure the grand final victory, their remarkable run to the finals in division one was a sign of the potential within the team. Individuals like Matt McVerry, who took home the goalkicking award, and joint Best and Fairest winners Gerard Steel and Samuel Batty, were among those who left an indelible mark on the field.

Subsequent years saw the Eagles aiming to replicate their initial success, with the Ashgrove Marist rivalry with Marymount College intensifying. Standout players included Matthew Rankine, David Mapleston, and Ben Scott, with Mapleston later being drafted into the Brisbane Lions Rookie list for 2001. Despite not always claiming victory, the team continued to build its legacy with determination and skill.

The early 2000s were a mixed bag for the Eagles, with some near misses and a few disappointments. However, 2003 saw a second-string Ashgrove Eagles team win the premiership, a hopeful prelude to further triumphs.

The following year, while the senior team finished as runners-up, the Ashgrove Eagles U15s went undefeated to win the premiership, a feat they would repeat in subsequent years. In 2005, the Ashgrove Eagles, led by Jack Lawler, clinched the AIC Undefeated Premiers title, a monumental achievement marking their tenth AFL season. Future AFL stars such as Lachlan Keeffe were part of these victorious squads.

By 2006 and 2007, the Opens continued to perform strongly, and the U15s achieved a remarkable four consecutive premierships. The coaching and managerial shifts in 2008 and 2009, with Peter Fowler and John Mulvihill taking the helm, continued to usher in success and growth for the teams across new age groups.

The inclusion of Charlie Cameron in the U16 team in 2009 marked the beginning of a journey for a player who would become a Brisbane Lions icon. The school's commitment to the sport was further evidenced in 2018 with the appointment of Brett Gillett as the AFL coordinator and the expansion into younger grades.

By 2019, the Ashgrove Eagles had established a complete AIC level Aussie Rules program, leading to the co-premiership victory in 2023, a testament to the program's success and the talent it nurtured, including the likes of Charlie Cameron and Lachlan Keeffe.

Jim Tracy, remembered affectionately as 'Tracka', passed away in 2010. A devoted Cats fan, Tracy never missed a Bears or Lions game and left a legacy that resonated deeply within the Ashgrove community. The reunion of the original Eagles team in 2023 served as a heartfelt tribute to their pioneering coach, with many flying in from across Australia to honour his memory.

The Ashgrove Eagles have come a long way since their inception, evolving from an underdog team to a formidable force in Queensland's school AFL competitions. As they celebrated their roots and remembered the man who started it all, the spirit of 'Tracka' Tracy and the enduring legacy of the Ashgrove Eagles were undeniably present at the Gabba.



CELEBRATING 30 YEARS OF HOUSE SYSTEM AT MCA

Br Terence Heinrich, MCA Headmaster from 1991-1996, introduced the House System to commence in January 1993. This involved a departure from the arrangements the College had operated under for most of its history. The change from an organisation within the College based on year groups to one dependent on Houses, eight of them, was significant.

The division of the boys and staff in the secondary school into eight groups, each composed of boys from initially each of the five-year groups (Years 8 to 12) and later six-year groups (Years 7-12), created the opportunity to better support helpful relationships between boys and staff, among the boys themselves and among staff. As the boys moved through school and up in seniority in their Houses, they assumed greater leadership and increasing responsibility for others in their House.

A number of decisions were made in the year leading into the House system start-up. David Meehan (1977), Foundation Head of Ridley House, provided this insight:

“Br Terry Heinrich consulted with the Foundation Heads of House with respect to their colours. Blue, Gold, Red and Green were obvious as they were the traditional sports houses at the College. It was then decided to have 2 Reds, 2 Greens, 2 Blues. Each House would have a colour that would clearly distinguish it at sporting carnivals. Gerard Monsour selected White for Ignatius and I went for Maroon, as Des Ridley was a Queenslander and represented and captained Queensland in Rugby, hence the Maroon association seemed a natural fit. We also realised how easy it was to get white and maroon coloured gear.”

Other Heads of House, such as Gilroy’s Foundation Head, Peter Tuckwell, thought their colours needed to be “modern and trendy” and opted for Light Green. Tony Byrne, long-term Ephrem Head of House, felt that some of the Foundation Heads decided on a colour because of association. For example: Ephrem - Dark Green, which was associated with the many gardens on the property which Br Ephrem helped beautify; Harold - Gold was very much linked with Eagle Heights where Br Harold Carlson had worked tirelessly. The winning Gold team at the Athletics carnival there in 1942 actually proposed the College warcry ‘Gunga Lora.’; Rush - Red is often associated with the Archbishop’s clerical garb.”

David Meehan advised with respect to the House Crests.

“Br Terry Heinrich decided on the shape of the crest for each House, with the mainly white sash going diagonally, vertically, or horizontally. Initially, there was just a House letter on the crest. Later Br Terry came up with a symbol, e.g., Ridley’s Laurel Wreath.

Later still, the Heads of House were advised to come up with a Latin motto and a second symbol if they wished. I brought in the ‘Three Violets’, which is the international symbol for the Marist Old Boys link.”

Tony Byrne incorporated the Fleur-de-lis, a lily which took on Marian symbolism in the Middle Ages and established the flower as an iconographic attribute of the Virgin Mary. This combined well with two roses above, both stemmed and leaved, which thrived in the College gardens. Peter Spensley (1970), Head of Slattery House, included the red poinsettia, the Brisbane floral emblem. The Irish Harp was added to the green Gilroy crest, an instrument in recognition of music teacher, Mrs Gilroy. Ignatius House would add the Ashgrove landmark, the Kauri Pine, which had been prominent on the ‘Flats’. Harold House had the Eagle rising, which was appropriate because of the connection with Eagle Heights. Foley House accepted the symbol of the anchor so as to be steadfast leaders.

The Head of House is usually the first point of contact for parents if they have any concerns for their son/s. Tutors meet with students every morning, and weekly House meetings can involve presentations, small group discussions, Year level meetings, and social gatherings. Boys generally stay in the same House during all their secondary years and usually develop firm friendships with the other boys in the House. Various College activities involve competition between Houses.





RIDLEY HOUSE

Named after Des Ridley, an outstanding schoolboy and gifted sportsman who died tragically and very young.

House Colour: Maroon

Motto: *SUAUITER IN MODO FORTITER IN RE* (Gentle in Manner, Resolute in Deed)



EPHREM HOUSE

Named after Br Ephrem Stevens, missionary and long serving teacher who worked tirelessly to beautify the College.

House Colour: Green

Motto: *FACTA NON VERBA* (Deeds Not Words)



FOLEY HOUSE

Named after Tom Foley, Marist College Ashgrove's first P&F President, an exemplary supporter and energetic leader.

House Colour: Navy Blue

Motto: *GLORIAM* (Hope of the Glory)



GILROY HOUSE

Named after Kitty Gilroy, teacher, musician, loyal friend of the College and staff member for 25 years.

House Colour: Light Green

Motto: *SUO MOTU* (On One's Own Initiative)



HAROLD HOUSE

Named after Br Harold Carlson, a College pioneer and worker extraordinaire in shaping the College.

House Colour: Gold

Motto: *FACTUM EST LABORE ET HONORE* (It is Done by Labour and Honour)



IGNATIUS HOUSE

Named after Br Ignatius O'Connor, the College's first Headmaster and visionary who contributed magnificently to the College's early years.

House Colour: White

Motto: *EX NIHILO NIHIL FIT* (Nothing Comes From Nothing)



RUSH HOUSE

Named after Archbishop Francis Rush, former Archbishop of Brisbane and a great leader and ever-encouraging friend of the College.

House Colour: Red

Motto: *IN SPIRITU INVICTUS* (Invincible Spirit)



SLATTERY HOUSE

Named after Leo Slattery, a long serving College teacher with outstanding commitment to the College.

House Colour: Sky Blue

Motto: *CONTENDE CONFIRMA CONSUMMA* (Strive, Encourage, Achieve)

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VALE KEVIN ROW (1946)

Judge Kevin Frank Charles Row (1946) passed away peacefully on June 17, 2023 in Caloundra where he had been living. His early years had been spent at Tewantin and Cooroy.

Kevin was a past OBA President (1957) and the recipient of the highest accolade that the OBA can bestow—the Arthur Apelt Memorial Service Award (2016), awarded in appreciation for his valuable lifetime contribution to MCA and the Old Boys' Association.

Kevin worked generously with Br Peter Carrick with the art unions in the late 50s and early 60s and had a very special role in the production of 'Canvas of Dreams'. He was Chairman of the Committee charged with the task of researching and collating all the material which was available. Br Mark Farrelly, the author who embraced the project so enthusiastically, wrote to Kevin, just prior to the launch on June 1, 1990, recognising his great contribution to the record of the first 50 years of the College.

"Thanks Kevin for guiding the project of this history so carefully over the years. I appreciated your support and kindness very much."

On July 29, 1991, the Marist Brothers welcomed Kevin into the Australian Marist Affiliation. The Provincial at the time, Br Alexis Turton described Kevin as "One of the pillars that make up the edifice that is our Marist Ashgrove odyssey."

Kevin had enrolled at the then St Mary's Ashgrove as a boarder in 1943, but because of WW2 the College had moved to Eagle Heights. The College shifted back to Ashgrove in 1945 and Kev graduated in 1946. Kevin excelled academically and at sport. He was a member of the 1st XI as first change bowler who were undefeated premiers. He was in the Athletics team, running in the 100, 220 yard events as well as the relay. He was also a member of the Open Tennis 1st IV that were premiers. Kev played outside centre in the 1st XIII that were premiers in 1945 and 1946 and after he left school, he played rugby union for Maristonians, a club Br Cyprian established, which was the forerunner to Wests at Toowong.

Kevin completed Arts and Law degrees at UQ and was admitted to the Bar in December, 1952. He had a very successful career at the Bar and was appointed a Judge of the District Court in February 1980. He was appointed a Judge of the Local Government Court and spent a great deal of his time on the Bench in that jurisdiction. Kevin retired in 1994.

Kevin had married Vondell Cruden, whose brother Alf was a first day pupil of the College. Sadly Vondell died in 2004. Their only son, Christopher attended MCA from 1968 to 1975 while their daughter Cary attended MSM. Some years later, Kevin married Veronica Rosen, who herself was a mother of two Ashgrove Old Boys.

Throughout his life, Kevin maintained a very close connection with many of his classmates. The Marist spirit was always important to him and Kevin will always be remembered for his close association and effort on behalf of the College and the Old Boys. Kev was also a dearly loved Father, Grandfather and Great-grandfather and his Funeral service was held in Caloundra to a capacity congregation, on June 26, 2023.



VALE MICHAEL ASHLEY (1956) MULLINS SM

These brief Reflections on Ashgrove Old Boy Fr Michael Mullins SM are largely taken from comments regarding Michael's life was given at his funeral mass by Father Paul Sullivan SM and Michael's brother Peter Mullins.

Michael Mullins was born on the 25th of November 1940 the same day as his father Major George Mullins arrived in Egypt with Australian troops in World War II. Michael was named after the Archangel Michael the patron saint of soldiers and after his mother's maiden name.

Major Mullins was an engineer and was sent by the Japanese to work on the notorious Burma Railway. It would be 5 years before Father and Son were to meet each other. During this time Michael grew up under the tender care of five women, his mother, grandmother and aunts. Michael was taught by the Sisters of Mercy at Wentworthville and by the Marist Brothers in Parramatta, Ashgrove (1951-1956) and Camberwell Victoria. He was frequently heard expressing his admiration and gratitude to the Brothers who taught him. He did well at school winning a Commonwealth Scholarship and a bursary to Melbourne University. He did not take these up however choosing to try his vocation with the Marist Fathers novitiate at Glen Davis.

As a clinical psychologist, one of Michael's guiding principles was that if you want to understand a person you need first of all to understand their family of origin. From his father, Michael was blessed with the gift of courage to face difficult and challenging situations. He was ready willing and able to name and speak the truth or if you prefer - to fire a 'shot', if and when required and sometimes even when not required!

Michael himself developed a gift of integrity and professionalism in his ministry. A significant influence on his life were his studies at the East Asian Pastoral Institute in Manila Philippines and the Tavistock Institute in England. He especially valued his local and international networks. He was a strong presence among professional colleagues in a Sydney Reflection group once a month for 30 years. They named their group "A Work in Progress".



The gifts of courage compassion integrity and professionalism shaped Michael's ministry.

As Superior of the Marist Formation program Hunters Hill in Sydney Michael with the participation of other religious institutes and ecumenical colleges transformed the academic program into the Catholic Theological Union that was to become part of the Sydney College of Divinity - a degree granting body. This was the formation for mission for women, men, lay religious clerical students together. The key to the program was the integration of four foundational principles, namely - intellectual, human, pastoral and spiritual formation.

With his friend and professional colleague Marist priest Father Gerald Arbuckle he became very involved in what was known as Refounding Pastoral Development. For Michael this involved the facilitation of General Chapters, Assemblies and the Supervision of Leadership Teams and individual leaders involved in ministry both in Australia and many countries overseas especially those involving the Marist Family.

Michael and his younger brothers Peter (1964) and Tim (1967) were all Old Boys of Ashgrove. Michael inherited his parents belief in hard work until the day he died aged 82. He also inherited his father's characteristic of not suffering fools gladly although this was always tempered by a genuine hard won Christian charity. As Peter said in his reflection as "we were all taught by the Marist Brothers to use our talents to the fullest in the service of others." Michael lived a very rich and fulfilling life following his parents example. Michael had been ordained a priest on the 10th of July 1965 and he died in his sleep on the 10th of July 2023 exactly 58 Years later. He would have been pleased with this symmetry.

How wonderful it was that he should slip so easily into God's hands.




VALE WILLIAM HENRY (1956)

William Henry was the fifth of nine children, with 3 brothers and 5 sisters. He was a man of few words, yet throughout his life he was known by many names amongst family, friends and colleagues: William, Will, Willy, Bill and 'Snowy' to his siblings because of his pale skin and white hair when he was a boy. William grew up in the family home at 21 Harding Street, Enoggera.

William and his three brothers, Michael (1954), John (1956), and Patrick (1960) all attended Marist College Ashgrove. William's sons, Stephen (1983), Paul (1985), Dominic (1994), and Joseph (1996), and grandsons Jack (2022), James (Year 11, 2023) and Leo (Year 11, 2023) have followed him through MCA as the Henry tradition proudly continues at the school.

William became an electrician as soon as he left school, taking up the trade from his father, William Duffy Snr. He went on to apprentice three of his own children as electricians - Paul, Dominic and Joseph.

William married Mary in April 1963 and they built a home at Lomatta Street, The Gap where they have lived all their life and raised their family. This year they celebrated 60 years of marriage. 

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
