



The OBA extends its special welcome to Mike as he joins his brothers in the association.




STOWERS CLOSE TO WRAPPING UP A GENERATION OF CONTRIBUTION

On completing his late secondary years at BGS, Chilla studied medicine at UQ and then specialised in obstetrics .


Chilla played Rugby for UQ and then Queensland in 1952 to 1959. In 1957, Chilla played his first test for Australia against the touring All Blacks. In 1958, he was Captain when Queensland beat NSW 10-6 for only the second victory over them since the War. This performance vaulted him into the captaincy of the 1958 Wallabies to NZ. This gallant team won the Second Test by 6-3 and Wilson shone in the Australian pack. Des Connor and Terry Curley also gave exemplary performances under their inspiring captain. He captained his country three times in Tests and was Captain in eight other matches. He later managed the Australian tour to NZ in 1982, to Italy and France in 1983, and the Grand Slam Tour of 1984. In the 60s, Chilla was a great asset, playing as captain-coach of Western Districts and then just coaching Wests A grade which culminated in 1968 with a narrow prelim final loss to premiers Brothers.

Chilla was much loved and respected and lived his life to the fullest. He will be missed. He remained forever an Ashgrove man with the rare honour of being a Foundation Student. Vale to the great man of whom we are all so proud.

VALE TERRY CURLEY

Marist College Ashgrove and the Australian Rugby community are mourning the death on October 17, 2016 of former MCA teacher, and Wallaby Terrence Curley at the age of 78.

Terry was born in Newcastle and became a Wallabies fullback at 18 and went on to earn 11 Test caps, before retiring to enter the Marist Brothers. He had attended St. Josephs College Hunters Hill which won the Sydney GPS Rugby competition in 1955.

Terry made his Test debut at the SCG (May 25, 1957), twelve days before his 19th birthday against the formidable All Blacks and then played the second test (June1, 1957) at the Brisbane Exhibition Ground. His performances earned him selection for the Wallabies tour to Great Britain where he starred in 34 matches throughout Britain, France and America, including all five Tests.

In 1958, Terry toured NZ with the Wallabies and in the Second Test at Christchurch, the Wallabies won 6-3. Terry Curley had kicked a lineout penalty just before halftime. The 20year old Terry Curley had an immaculate game at fullback and continually stemmed the tide when the All Blacks

threatened. Terry Curley was adjudged by the experts to have given one of the greatest fullback displays in Wallaby history. Terry Curley continued his brilliant form in the Third Test at Auckland, then retired prematurely to go into the Marist Brothers. Many could not understand this extraordinary decision which was so life-changing and involved great sacrifice.

1965 was his first year at Ashgrove and his first teaching appointment after he was professed as a Marist Brother. He was Sportsmaster from 1965-70 and was an excellent teacher of Chemistry. As Br. Terrence Curley he would have a profound influence on all at Ashgrove. Some of the Senior Class of 65 remembered him fondly.

Robert Keating (65): "As a 17 year old to have a Chemistry teacher of such an international reputation and interesting story of commitment was quite amazing and inspiring. We could not understand why he gave up such an exciting

international rugby career to follow his calling to dedicate his life to serving us but even in his first year of teaching he gave so much of himself and what he believed in i.e. the Marist Brothers ethos and pursuit of individual excellence in whatever you tried to achieve.

Whether you agreed with his style or not it certainly made you think and form an opinion.

He along with many of the Brothers from my time at Ashgrove had an amazing impact on my life. May he rest in peace."

Laurie Ceccato (65): "I have very fond memories of Terry's cricket training. We would regularly go for 5 mile runs and at training we would do half hour fitness training before we could touch a cricket ball. I am sure his coaching methods helped in securing the 1st XI and 1st XV Premierships."

Bryan Dollar (65): "He drove us to seek perfection."

David L'Estrange (66): "Many enjoyed his time at Ashgrove, including his very strong views on life, and I include myself am one who benefitted greatly from my contact with him and his support at and after my time at the college."

Throughout his six years at MCA he coached many sporting premierships. The Annual Blue and Gold Magazines have recorded many of his thought provoking and motivating statements which enriched our lives and raised the bar to achieve incredible sporting successes. Some classic examples from the years 1965-70 include;

1965: 1st XV Premiers. Praise for the standard of Rugby could be no better summarized than in the comment of John

VALE TERRY CURLEY (CONTINUED)

Thornett's "Clairvoyant" and Jules Guerassimoff's "Exhilarating and Purposeful"

1966: The 1stXV Premiers provoked the challenge and prompted the Kennedian philosophy of what the individual can do for the team, rather than what the team should do for the individual.

1967: The record of the 1st XI, in going through the cricket season undefeated was a triumph, not so much for the extraordinary cricket ability of the team, but rather for the human values the team as a whole portrayed, namely a wonderful team morale, co-operation and refusal to say "die".

1968: It could not be said that "what paralyses life is a failure to believe and failure to dare," because in all games each member tried to give that little extra to the game. (1stXI cricket MCA were Undefeated Runners-Up after one game was deemed unplayable when all other games in the competition proceeded).

1969: "And when the last great scorer writes against our name, he writes not that we won or lost, but how we played the game. (Sir Henry Newbolt)"

After the 1st XV recorded a Co-Premiership. In this life, man has all but too few opportunities to do something great. Each encounter has to be so treated as such an opportunity.

1970: "Our lives are what our thoughts make them."

Successful rugby only comes from successful thinking.

How fortunate we were to be educated by this great man who inspired everyone to strive to be the best they could be.

When David L'Estrange (66) and Bill Andrews (66) travelled to Mittagong where he was in a care facility in May 2016, they were told that Terry had little time to live. He remained strong and philosophical about his situation saying that he had a very good life and that it was his time. Our thoughts and prayers are with his wife Libby at this sad time.

ARTHUR APELT MEMORIAL SERVICES AWARD TO KEVIN ROW BY TOM TRESTON

The depression and the years of WW2 were the background to his childhood and adolescence, but it was family, friends and Marist boarding school which were strong influences in Kevin Frank Charles Row's life as he transitioned from country boy to respected Barrister and Judge.

He was born at Gympie on 27th November 1929 to parents Frank Alban (Ab) Row and Vera Margaret (nee Crank). Kevin's early years were spent at Tewantin and Cooroy where he and his older sister (Noela Catherine) lived a carefree life with a large extended family living nearby. Both of his parents were keen tennis players and that background later helped him when he came to Ashgrove. In 1945 he and 3 other boys won the Interschool Senior Tennis Shield with both Kevin and Neil Pedrazzini both being undefeated in their singles matches.

He attended school at Tewantin until Year 3. He then went to Cooroy school, where his mother had been enrolled during the school's inaugural year. He rode a horse to school. He went to St Joseph's in Nambour in his Scholarship year(1942). It was run by the Good Samaritan sisters.

In the early 1940s, the very new St. Mary's at Ashgrove was proactive in recruiting students. The Principal, Brother Ignatius, travelled to country areas in his green Tetraplane to invite Catholic families to send their sons to the College. Kevin was enrolled in 1943 as a boarder, the College having moved to Eagle Heights. He was given the duty of Sacricist and so was privileged to be boarded in the old garage with senior boys. Many Beaudesert boys came to Eagle Heights, one of them being Tom Kassulke who was later to become Best Man at Kevin's wedding. Kevin chipped a tooth while boxing at Eagle Heights. He recalls the trip to Mr. Sneesby (a dentist in George Street) with Br. Ignatius having one hand on the steering wheel along the very narrow winding road with the other hand clutching his Rosary.

As we know, the College shifted back to Ashgrove in 1945. Kevin excelled both academically and at sport (swimming excluded), despite his young age - he was not quite 17 years when he finished Senior. He was a member of the First XI (as first change bowler), who were undefeated Premiers. He was in the Athletic team, running in the 100 and 200 yard events, and was a member of the relay team.

He played outside centre in the 1st XIII (in one match he scored 4 tries).

Although beaten in their first match in 1945, they became Premiers and they were undefeated Premiers in 1946. After he left school he played Union with the Maristonians, a club which Br. Cyprian established. I believe they won the "B" Grade competition in 1948 but perhaps promotion of the team to First Grade led to the demise of the Club.

On leaving school, he worked for three months in the PMG before transferring to the Commonwealth Crown Solicitor's Office, He did Arts and Law degrees at UQ and on completing his degrees was admitted to the Bar on 16th December 1952. He had a very successful career at the Bar and was appointed a Judge of the District Court on 4th February 1980. He was appointed Judge of the Local Government Court and spent a great deal of his time on the Bench in that jurisdiction. He retired on 12th July 1994. He was, and still is, immensely proud of the fact that at one stage there were more Judges on the Federal, Supreme and District Courts who were Old Boys of Ashgrove than there were Old Boys of both Nudgee and Terrace combined!!!

Kevin always involved himself in Old Boys activities in earlier years. The 1956 Blue and Gold contains the following report -"An informal meeting, instigated by Br. Peter Carrick, was held in May. At this meeting a temporary committee was formed to organise the first Annual General Meeting of the Old Boys' Association. Vigorous efforts by this committee, especially by Kevin Row (and two others) were amply rewarded by an attendance of over 80 at the AGM held on August 17th...."

Needless to say, Kevin became one of the Committee members. He was the one largely responsible for drafting the Constitution. He was determined that the term of President should be limited to two consecutive years (was this because the President of the OBA of another College was in office for many, many years?) Kevin became President of the OBA in 1957. He remembers working with Br. Peter Carrick on Art Unions in the small room at the back of the Chapel, which was then on the ground floor of the Tower Block.

He had a very special role in the production of "Canvas of Dreams". He was Chairman of a committee charged with the task of researching and collating all of the material which was available. The Committee met monthly at the College for up to a year. The meetings were followed by dinner in the Brothers' dining room. He says that the publication had a gestation period of at least two years. He approached the person who had worked on the Joeys book with a request that he edit it, but had no success.

Brother Christopher then took a hand and persuaded Brother Mark Farrelly to take on the tedious job. Thankfully, he embraced the project enthusiastically. Needless to say, Kevin was still very much involved with meetings and carrying out his own research. He had particular assistance from Dan Flynn who, as Secretary to the Archdiocese, provided access to archives, to John Brosnan for his recollections of Beaudesert (as you know, many Beaudesert boys attended the College), and to Val Pearson (assistant Music Teacher at the College who became John's wife) for her insight into behind the scenes life at the College. Of course, there are many others who assisted Kevin and Mark Farrelly and they are named in the Preface to the book.

It was a major undertaking under Kevin's overall supervision and with his very direct involvement. The culmination was the launching of the book on 1st June 1990.

The launch took place at a special dinner at the College attended by many members of the P & F, Old Boys and their wives, and other College supporters. Kevin was successful in arranging for the Governor of Queensland, Sir Walter Campbell, to launch the book. Kevin must have prevailed upon the Governor to take great interest in the book as he gave an excellent resume of it.

Shortly prior to the launch (22nd May 1990) Br Mark Farrelly, wrote the following note to Kevin, recognising his great contribution to the production of the record of the first 50 years of the College:
"Thanks Kevin for guiding the project of this history so carefully over the years. I appreciated your support and kindness very much"

On the 29th July 1991 the Marist Brothers welcomed Kevin into the Australian Marist Affiliation. The Provincial at the time was that great friend of ours, Br. Alexis. He has recently written along these lines about Kevin:

Kevin has always been in that special group of quiet, solid and very loyal Old Boys. His involvement as a student, and as an Old Boy has been very comprehensive. His student days were filled with study and sport. As an ex-student, he took particular pride in noting College successes when compared to some of the more "prestigious" Catholic or Independent Schools of the time. That did not change when he graduated to Old Boy and parent ranks. When he took on a task such as the leadership of the Old Boys and the promotion of the College, it was well done. He was one of those who saw the need of a College History and despite initial setbacks, with his typical (legal?) persistence and thoroughness, Canvas of Dreams became a reality. Kevin is one of the pillars that make up the edifice that is our Marist Ashgrove odyssey.

Throughout his life, Kevin maintained a very close connection with many of his classmates. In his profession, and as a Judge, he travelled to a number of centres in Queensland. He always made contact with John Brosnan in Cairns, Ron Leong in Townsville, Charlie Barbagallo in Innisfail and Ray Cottrell in different towns and cities where Ray happened to be working. Of course, he frequently saw Brisbane class mates Bill Roberts, Kevin Osborne, and Tom Kassulke as well as other Old Boys Dan Flynn and Jock Murdoch. The Marist spirit was always very important to him

Kevin married Vondell Cruden, whose brother Alf was a first day pupil of the College. Sadly Vondell died in 2004. Their only son Christopher attended Ashgrove from 1968 to 1975. Kevin has since married Veronica Rosen, who herself is the mother of two Ashgrove Old Boys.

I am sure all will agree that Kevin Row's 70 plus years of close association and effort on behalf of the College and the Old Boys warrants his receiving the Arthur Apelt Award for 2016.

MICHAEL BOHL (1979) OLYMPIC SWIMMING COACH

Michael Bohl (1979) is married to Cate, and has two daughters, Georgia and Charlotte. MCA has played a major part in his Swimming success. As a coach, he is a great communicator, but it's not all sunshine and rainbows. As a squad member reflected: "If you have a crap session, he'll let you know, but most of all he listens. He is a really good guy."

Michael Bohl grew up in the middle of four sisters in the



Brisbane inner-Northern suburb of The Grange. Michael was a typical knockabout youngster until struck down with a virus that robbed him of 90% of vision in one eye. The family doctor advised against ever playing contact sport in case his good eye was damaged. Bohl's father, George, a giant of a man who was desk sergeant at Brisbane Watchhouse had played 1st XV GPS rugby for three years before joining the Police Force. He didn't like the idea of his only son sitting on the sidelines while others played sport, so at the age of seven, he took him to Cheryl Kensett's swim squad at Wilston State School.

Cheryl Kensett had represented Australia in the 400m freestyle at the 1962 Commonwealth Games in Perth, WA and didn't take long to realise she had something special on her hands. Michael had everything, the physique, the determination but at this stage it was important he shouldn't be pushed too heavily, too early. He was sent on to Ron Johns at Centenary Pool, Spring Hill after about 3 weeks and for the next two years Ron Johns brought him along slowly.

Michael enrolled at Marist College Ashgrove as a Year 4 student in 1971 and around this time he started training seriously and needed a heated pool where he could train all year round. Bohl's parents moved him to the Fortitude Valley pool, to be coached first by John Rigby and later Bill Sweetenham. While Michael's school mates at Marist College Ashgrove were also immersed in their Rugby and Cricket, Swimming was also in their sights and their goal of Champion TAS school would be achieved in Michael's 1979 Senior year under his captaincy.

"Most memorable from my time at Ashgrove was the camaraderie within the College, especially from within our cohort. Our final year, 1979 was the year Ashgrove won the Swimming, Cricket, Athletics and Rugby for the first time. Swimming had always eluded us because of St. Laurence's domination since 1956, but 1979 was the first time we ever won the aggregate to be champion TAS school.

But, back to 1971 and as a Year 4 Gold student, Michael would become U9 Age Champion and be instrumental in the Greens winning the Intra-School Swimming Carnival which they also retained the following year. Amazingly, Michael's new College record of U9 50m freestyle of 34.3 seconds was close to John Moore's 1941 Open record of 34 seconds while Michael's new U9 50 m Breaststroke record (46.4 seconds) eclipsed John Moore's 1941 Open record by 4.1 seconds! In perspective though, standards had improved markedly in that thirty year period as professional coaching became more prevalent. In that same year 1971, Fred Lizzio broke the Open College 50m Freestyle record swimming 28.4 seconds while Peter Nilsson (39.4 seconds) broke Bryan Meehans U15 50m Breaststroke from the year before.

Michael Bohl's fine performances continued in 1972, rewriting the College records (6 new records) as well as setting 6 new records in the Combined Catholic Colleges Carnival with his 6 first places! Once again Michael was College U10 years Age Champion. Michael would become Age Champion in all 9 years he attended Ashgrove. In 1973, Michael attained 5 first and set 5 new CCC records. Ashgrove finished Runners-Up to SLC (270-259) but won the U11 and U12 CCC shields. These were MCA's first shields since the CCC was formed in 1958. Similarly in 1974, Ashgrove would retain the U12 shield as Champion CCC school.

In 1975, Michael contested the Australian Age Group Championships in Adelaide. There was "Swimming Glitter" celebrations when he returned with 3 wins in the 12 years and under, 200 m individual medley, 200 m breaststroke, and 100m backstroke. At the 1976 TAS Carnival, Michael provided the team's best performance winning the U14 100 m freestyle, 50m backstroke, 50m breaststroke, 50m butterfly and the Open 400 m freestyle. Michael would win every individual stroke in U15 at TAS the following year, 1977. Once again he returned victorious from the Australian

Age Championships winning 4 individual events in the 13-14 years, 200 m butterfly, 100 m Backstroke, 200 m Backstroke and 200 m Individual Medley. In 1978, Michael was in Year 11 and celebrated training in MCA's new 50 metre pool gaining 5 first places in the TAS Open Division, all College records and 3 of them TAS records.

Most of the events and times of 1978 were significantly lowered in 1979 as were the Open Freestyle (1.47.36) and Medley relays (2.04.52) which he anchored home. For the first time since the inception of TAS in 1956, Ashgrove would win the Aggregate Championship with Michael, fittingly squad Captain. This set the scene for the many TAS/AIC Championships that have followed.

In the years preceding Michael's amazingly successful performances for MCA, it's interesting to note the steady improvement from the early 60's at TAS especially in the 100 m Breaststroke and 100m-400 m freestyle.

In 1962, Open 100 m breaststroke Rodney Tabrett swam 1 min 26 sec. Open freestyle Brian Allingham 1 min 6 sec , U16 100 m freestyle John Sontag 1 min 3.9 sec. 400 m freestyle John Sontag 5 min 10 sec.

In 1969, Open 100m Breaststroke Sam Bonanno swam 1min 20 sec. 200 m Freestyle Ross Newman 2 mins 34.4 sec. U16 100m freestyle, James Houston 1 min 3.2 sec and 200m freestyle 2 mins 25.7 secs and 400 m freestyle James Houston (U16) 5 mins 20 seconds.

As expected, all Michael's school swimming records have been lowered in the intervening years to today. Aaron Bourke (94), a Commonwealth Games representative to Canada in 1994 is still the holder of the school freestyle record for 100 m 52.17, 200 m 1.51.65 and 400 m 3.57.29 while Sebastian Leavy MCA Grade 10 student swimming in the U15 National Age Group Titles swam extraordinary times in 100m Breaststroke 1min 5.23 sec , 200m Breasstroke 2min22.9 secs and 50m Breaststroke in 29.86 secs.! Michael set the standard and the swimmers of Ashgrove have responded impressively!

Michael was effusive in his praise for MCA and his fellow students and Teachers:

"Sport was a high priority at MCA and the staff and fellow students were very supportive throughout the years I attended, 1971-79.

In Primary School, Mr. Bob McCosker, Jack Eales ('I'm going to come down on you like a ton of bricks, son!'), Alan Clarke, Graham Lawson, Mrs Monsour and Br. William, the number 1 supporter of swimming! From secondary years, Br. Paul McQuillan, Derek Cameron, Br. Kenneth, Br. Alexis, Mr. Paul Pattinson (coach), Brian Lindsay, Peter Spensley, Heath Chandler, Neville Solomon, Mick Gubbins, Barry Honan, Mrs Lynn Rive, Br Hugh, Br. Peter Corr (pretty sure he gave me my one and only 6 of the best for supplying the boarders with tobacco and tally ho! - but it didn't hurt!!) Being absorbed into the great football tradition that Ashgrove had over the years and watching players go on to represent Queensland and Australia has been a highlight for me. Watching the Rugby teams, especially the firsts was a fond memory. Brendan Moon playing football and running at TAS Athletics was very memorable. A great memory for was when I had two races, back to back at TAS Swimming and Fr. Tom Moloney, who was the announcer, beefed up all the announcements between my back to back races to give me more time to recover. It was most appreciated at the time by me, and I'm still not sure whether the other schools were awake as to what was happening! Thanks Fr. Tom!"

AFTER SCHOOL

In 1979, aged 17, Michael made his first Australian team on a tour to Japan and the U.K. He returned confident of making the Moscow Olympics in backstroke and medley, but 1980 was not a good time to be a swimmer in Australia. With the USA boycotting the Games over Russia's invasion of Afghanistan and the Australian Government pressuring individual athletes to pull out, the Australian Olympic Committee selected a team of only 17 swimmers, rather than the usual 30-plus. Despite finishing second in his qualifying events, Bohl was cruelly left at home. Despondent, he considered quitting the sport but grabbed a lifeline in the shape of a scholarship offer from Southern Illinois University in the USA. He returned after two years and joined the star-studded squad of the charismatic Laurie Lawrence in time to make the team for the 1982 Brisbane Commonwealth Games. Michael swam in the 200 m Individual medley final, placing fifth. It was won in world record time by Canadian Alex Baumann.

Bohl had a second crack at making the Olympic team for the 1984 Los Angeles Games. Michael was ranked top in Australia in three events and 100% committed to making that Olympic team. "I just swam terribly at the trials. I think I was third, fourth, fifth. I put too much pressure and expectation of myself because I was so pissed off about missing that last one. It still eats at me today. That's what's made Georgia making the Rio Olympics team extra special. You learn a lesson and it's helped me as a coach. You want to get your swimming up for the big events, but not too much. It's finding that balance."

In 1987, after a stint at the AIS where he met his wife Cate Welch, a track sprinter, Bohl gave up swimming, returned to Brisbane, waited tables and enrolled in teachers college. Cheryl Kensett was coaching at the Queensland University Pool and was determined to hand over her squad to the right person. The day of the big, rough, tough, brutish coach was over. Michael with his more contemporary demeanour, intelligence and patience was ideal.

His first Australian representative was Angus Waddell, who won a Silver medal at the 1990 Auckland Commonwealth Games in the 50 metre freestyle. Two years later, Waddell and Darren Lange became his first Olympians when they made the team for Barcelona. The foundations for the medal factory were being laid, but Bohl says in his mind the results were never measured only by how high on the podium his swimmers stood.

"I've always had the philosophy, whoever comes in you just do the best

possible job you can. From the best swimmer in the group to the worst, these kids are getting up at the five o'clock to come in and train. They're doing everything you're asking them to do so you've got to feel that responsibility."

These days Bohl has access to hi-tech sports science that coaches such as Don Talbot, Laurie Lawrence and even the forward thinking pioneer Forbes Carlile could never have dreamed of. But for all the statistics and printouts and sessions with the QAS scientists, at Bohl's medal factory it's still about body and mind. Hard work and self-belief.

"If they don't believe they're a chance of doing something, they're not going to get there. You can have them so well-conditioned, so well primed, but if they truly don't believe, it's really hard for them to get the best of themselves."

In 2003, two monumental events came together to secure the future of Michael Bohl's medal factory. First St. Peter's Lutheran College offered him the position of head swim coach. As well as having access to the school's superb facilities for his club squads, he now runs their school program, his reputation and expertise attracting international students from as far away as Malaysia, Singapore, Hong Kong plus all states of Australia. "if it wasn't for the school, I couldn't afford to coach in Australia," citing big offers from Spain and Saudi Arabia.

The second event was when a 15 year old girl named Stephanie Rice arrived at training. The best coaches have at least one champion with whom they will always be associated. Carlile had Shane Gould, Talbot first made his reputation with the Konrads "twins", John and Ilsa, and Lawrence will always be remembered for his reaction in the stands when Duncan Armstrong won

In Beijing, when Rice ruled the Olympic aquatic centre known as the "Ice Cube", by winning both the 200m and 400m medleys in world record time, she took Bohl to the top of his profession. From then on, theirs would be a partnership written in the pages of sporting history.

In Rio de Janeiro, 2016, 37 Australian swimmers competed, but no other coach had a squad so large as Bohl's. Seven swimmers this year; in London four years ago he had nine, in Beijing in 2008, only three, but one was triple gold medallist and Female Swimmer of the Meet, Stephanie Rice. It's a record that puts him in elite company, alongside the likes of Don Talbot, who also had seven swimmers including gold medallists Bob Windle and Kevin Berry, on the team at the Tokyo Olympics in 1964, and Bohl's own former coach and mentor, Laurie Lawrence who had eight at Seoul in 1988, including 200metre freestyle champion, Duncan Armstrong.

If sports historians wanted to illustrate a chart mapping the development of swim coaching in this country over the past half century, they could do worse than use images of these three: gruff hard-taskmaster Talbot; master motivator Lawrence and the latest model, Bohl, who combines elements of both his predecessors, along with his own ingredient, described by his first coach as "contemporary demeanour".




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
